My Experience as the 1st Special Force Group (Airborne) Dentist

It is a tremendous honor and privilege to serve as the dentist for the 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) [1st SFG (A)]. The 1st SFG (A) is situated in Washington State with units in Japan. Since September 11, 2001, the 1st SFG (A) personnel have played a vital role in fighting terrorism and violent terrorist organizations around the globe by participating in various operations for the DoD. From humanitarian assistance and training of indigenous forces, to combat operations, Special Forces Soldiers live up to the Special Forces motto: De Oppresso Liber, "To Free the Oppressed."

My experience as the 1st SFG (A) dentist over the last three years is based off the needs of the unit and the priorities of the Group Sur-



geon, which may vary from the experiences of my predecessors and my peers currently serving with the 3rd, 5th, 7th and 10th SFG (A). I was fortunate to work with three different dental technicians: SGT Tyler Labatte, SGT Terry Johnson, and currently SGT Luis Barraza. Together we developed novel systems, tools, and mechanisms to anticipate, track, and drive dental readiness to enable 1st SFG (A) to be a dental ready force during the COVID19 global pandemic and in support of operations in the INDOPACOM area of responsibility and Afghanistan. We routinely tracked DENTRIX, in MHS Genesis, MEDPROS and the Corporate Dental Application. We have developed internal 1st SFG (A) metrics, and aggressively pushed 30-60-90 day reports to the battalion surgeons and physician assistants in order to schedule and treat DRC 4, DRC 3, and pending DRC 4 Soldiers.

Critical to the 1st SFG (A) medical mission, we taught twelve quarterly Dental Non-Trauma modules for the all of the unit's Medical NCOs that culminated in their dental sustainment certification with over 540 hours of didactic and hands-on training. These modules comprised head and

neck anatomy, dental sick call, dental anesthesia, exodontia, maxillo-mandibular fixation, and suturing. We also facilitated shadowing in clinic for several dozen Medical Sergeants.

To build credibility with our unit, we conducted daily physical training alongside the unit's operators performed airborne operations with jumps from the various platforms and fired on multiple weapon systems at various ranges. Although the COVID19 global pandemic curtailed our opportunities for operational dentistry, we did collaborate with the 673rd Dental Company (Area Support) during their field exercises to perform field dentistry.

As the last 63A to serve as a Group Dentist, I am extremely thankful for the opportunity to represent the Dental Corps in this unique operational force. For all you 63Bs interested in becoming a Group Dentist, please feel to reach out to me or any of the other Group Dentists. I would also highly encourage you to read Dick Couch's *Chosen Soldier* in order to understand your patients and the training they undertake to earn a Green Beret. If you would like a good read on the 1st SFG (A), I encourage you to pick up Jessica Donati's *Eagle Down* that chronicles one of our battalion's in Afghanistan.



Dental Support of Veterinary Medicine

Humans are not the only species treated by the Army Dental Care system.

Army dental practices provide their teams with a number of unique experiences. One of these experiences is having the opportunity to treat Military Working Dogs (MWDs). When requested by the veterinary clinic, dental teams are en-

couraged to assist with the treatment of these Army team members. Army Techniques Publication (ATP) 4-02.19 describes providing essential and emergency dental care to military working dogs as an additional role for dental personnel. The Army has published Technical Bulletin, Medical (TB MED) 298 to give providers guidance on how to provide dental care of the military working dog. Collaboration between the Army veterinary and dental activities is encouraged throughout these documents.



As with any Army activity, training and exercising skills is vital to accomplishing the mission. The treatment of MWDs is no different. Dental teams may need to answer the call to treat MWDs in theater. Having the opportunity to train

at residency programs or exercise skills in garrison develop proficient providers who can tackle the delivery of healthcare in theater.



The Advanced Education in General Dentistry 2-year program at Fort Hood has developed a cooperative relationship with the location veterinary clinic. A fractured or diseased tooth can end a MWD's career. Residents at Fort Hood support the conservation of the fight force of MWDs by

CPT Yann Rodenas, a 2021 graduate of the Fort Hood residency says, "The Army offers a unique opportunity for providers. I am very grateful for the opportunity to work with military working dogs at the two-year AEGD residency at Fort Hood. The training has prepared me to treat dental emergency for all service members, including military working dogs."

After completing training programs, it is important that dental providers are able to continue exercising their skills. The dental and veterinary teams at Fort Leavenworth are doing just that. "Our MDW had not been able to eat and wasn't himself. We diagnosed that he needed three root canals," explains CPT Tess Brunstein, a dentist at Smith Dental Clinic, Fort Leavenworth. She provided a dental examination, endodontic, and operative treatment to a MWD referred from the local veterinary clinic. The






veterinary team sedated the MWD to facilitate the treatment that CPT Brunstein provided. "It was so rewarding to hear back from his handler several weeks after the procedure that his partner was back to his happy self and eating normally again! I'm thankful for the opportunity and experience, and to assist in helping a canine teammate to get back in the fight," reflects CPT Brunstein. "Getting the opportunity to provide dental care to the MWD is an experience I have always wanted to be a part of as an Army Dentist."



Providing care to MWD while deployed


Dental teams conduct training to be prepared to provide dental care in theater. Den-




Dental Corps Officer Leadership Development Strategy

The development of leaders is an essential responsibility of every Army Soldier. The process of providing training, education, and experiences prepares leaders for higher levels of responsibility. As individuals, we must manage our assignments to ensure we get the most out of the leadership development process. The first step in managing your career is to understand the domains of the Army Leader Development Strategy.¹

The Army divides leadership development into three domains: Institutional, Operational, and Self-development Domains. The Institutional Domain is easiest to recognize. Dental school is the institutional training that provides the qualifications to become a dental officer. Professional military education (PME) is another Institutional Domain activity for leadership development in the profession of arms. The officer's educational track is Basic Officer Leadership Course (BOLC), Captain's Career Course (CCC), Intermediate Level Education (ILE), and Senior Service College, in progression. Leaders can then tailor their expertise by attending other courses, for example, precommand course, Tactical Combat Casualty Care (TCCC), JMESI Healthcare Executive courses, and others.

Self-development is the leader's lifelong, individual efforts to grow. Improvement in this domain is achieved

through personal activities like reading, individual study, self-assessment, and pursuit of career-related passions. The <u>Army Project Athena website</u>, which provides learning resources and self-development surveys, is an excellent resource for leader self-development.

Finally, Operational Domain activities are the experiences you receive in your clinics. Every patient encounter is a repetition in your development as a clinician. The Operational Domain is where you apply your institutional learning and self-development to real-time, on-the-job situations.

This article briefly outlined the three domains of the Army Leadership Development Strategy. Dental Officers must seek experiences in the Operation, Institutional, and Self-Development Domains to develop as Army leaders. By understanding the Army Leadership Development Strategy, leaders can manage their careers by balancing time to activities in each domain.

Presidio of Monterey Dental Clinic (POM DC) has been at the forefront of transitioning to the future of Army Digital Dentistry capabilities. For the past year and a half POM DC and Joint Base Lewis McChord (JBLM) have worked to leverage digital technology to address 3 immediate needs of our population:

- Enhance the *Readiness* of our population by reducing wait times
- Increase *Quality of Care* by reducing steps that induce inconsistency through human error.
- **Standardization** communication between specialists across the organization to enhance the **Safety** of our patients.

Through the support of COL Anderson, COL Mower, and JBLM DENTAC IT Mr. Phillip Wise digital dentistry was made a priority. Currently 100% of laboratory procedures at POM

DC are digitally assisted making POM one of the fully digital labs in the Army Dental Care System. Digital dentistry equipment at JBLM/POM DC was used to support the active duty community at Presidio of Monterey by providing mouth guards. CEREC Primescan and rapid model prototyping with the Formlabs 3D printer, were utilized in the fabrication of laminated custom athletic mouth guards. The event provided an opportunity with speak with our patients about common dental alveolar injuries, give a visual color image of their teeth for areal hygiene instruction, and identify class 4 petients to schedule.

their teeth for oral hygiene instruction, and identify class 4 patients to schedule them for examinations. Many patients left excited about their encounter and about the "scanner" at the dental clinic. Helping patients become advocates for their own oral health is important. 


Joint Base San Antonio Fort Sam Houston (JBSA FSH) DENTAC

On Jan. 24, 2022, JBSA FSH DENTAC went live with MHS Genesis (Dentrix Enterprise). Dr. William Martin, Dentrix SME for the Dental Corps, stated, "This was the smoothest roll out yet." Although the transition went very well, there are a number of lessons learned that can be shared.

LTC Sachiyo Kawaguchi, Officer in Charge, of Rhoades Dental Clinic, stated that identifying Super Users early on in the process was imperative to success during the Go Live week. Providing Super Users ample time to complete training facilitates the training of the remaining clinic staff. The Rhoades Dental Clinic team also noted that proper organization of training, adequate classroom capacity, accurate training rosters and verifying points of contacts with the LPDH team are needed prior to the Go Live week. Overall, the team at Rhoades Dental Clinic did exceptionally well in preparing to transition to MHS Genesis.




Mr. Darrell Meyers, JBSA DENTAC XO, stated that it is essential for other DENTACs transitioning to MHS Genesis (Dentrix) system to ensure that all providers (Dentist, Hygienist, X2s and EFDAs) have National Provider Identifier (NPI) numbers. This is critical in Dentrix to allow providers to receive appropriate workload credit. All clinic personnel must attend the Sign-On Fair prior to Go Live as Dentrix accounts and permissions are validated at the Sign-On Fair. Downloading all appointments from Corporate Dental System (CDS) one week prior to Go Live will enable the staff to



move the appointments to the correct provider when they are imported into Dentrix.

The Oral Maxillofacial Surgery (OMS) team at BAMC also had a very successful roll out. CPT Cason, OMS Chief Resident, discovered that the transition to MHS Genesis affected all aspects of how they provide care to their patients, from check-in to discharge. As expected, transition to a new system created apprehension, however, the team came together utilizing peer-to-peer training throughout the week.

COL Jeff Hambrice, JBSA DENTAC Commander, recommended that DENTAC leadership be included in the planning and

coordination of the Go Live process from the beginning. The Henry Schein dental team made themselves available for an out-brief with the command team a couple of days after Go Live week. Mr. Meyers stated, "The PIF team's contribution was invaluable and was more helpful and meaningful than the official computer-based and instructor-led training."

63B Experience Serving in a Dental Company (Area Support)

One of the important roles of a 63B Comprehensive Dentist in the DEN-TAC and FORSCOM is to implement excellent patient care in garrison and in the deployed environment. The Advanced Education in General Dentistry 2 residency provides advanced technique training that allowing 63Bs to be force multipliers where specialists are not available. The key to our training and skill as a 63B is knowing our limitations. Knowing when to refer to a specialist ensures our patients receive the care their sacrifice deserves.

I started my Army career in the Army Reserves in December 2000 as a Private. I wanted to do something more in my life and to serve in an organiza-



tion with a higher purpose. I served for nearly nine years on active duty including a deployment to Fort Knox, Kentucky in 2003 and a deployment to Forward Operating Base Victory, Iraq in 2006. I hit my goal of earning the rank of staff sergeant, as my father before me, and enjoyed the role of mentoring enlisted Soldiers while serving in multiple roles with the 3rd Medical Deployment Support Command, Fort Gillem, GA.

My passion for dentistry hit during my deployment to Iraq where I served as a dental assistant for our dentist. His mentorship led me to apply for dental school and I have zero regrets. My prior enlisted experience helps me to understand the multiple positions and responsibilities our enlisted Solders have in our dental clinics. Our clinics cannot function without them.

As the junior Deputy Consultant for General Dentistry to the Army Surgeon General, my favorite role is director of the Advanced Clinic Provider (ACP) program. The ability to motivate and mentor 63As to advance their clinical skills and knowledge allows them to grow personally in their military and dental professional skills. Officers who complete the ACP program gain the Additional Skill Identifier (ASI) 9F.

Currently, I am the Officer in Charge (OIC) of McClung Dental Clinic at Joint Base Lewis-McChord (JBLM) DENTAC and serve as a MTOE Assigned Personnel (MAP) with the 673rd Dental Company Area Support (DCAS). I became OIC in August 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic. Our clinic's mission for the I Corps Commander was dental readiness. The McClung Clinic NCOs have worked hard to achieve dental readiness for our patient population. The start of the 2022 Academic Year has been eventful at the Fort Hood Advanced Education in General Dentistry 2-year (AEGD-2) program. The entire staff has shown resiliency overcoming all obstacles brought on by the pandemic and they continue to deliver exceptional warrior-focused oral healthcare. This commitment to completing the training mission means that in a few months we will once again be graduating a group of world-class clinicians and military leaders at Fort Hood!



Didactic training has been filled with terrific guest consultants who have all enhanced the resident's knowledge. In October, the program took part in a virtual CBCT course courtesy of MAJ Robert Hilton, USAF OMR. They have participated in multiple hands-on training opportunities. Courses hosted by industry representatives taught residents how to use different surgical and restorative products and techniques, from esthetic composite resin placement to surgical placement of dental implants to bone regeneration.

Our mentors deserve recognition for some outstanding professional accomplishments this year. Three of our faculty members completed steps toward board certification during the Fall semester. MAJ Colleen Segall (63K) achieved full board certification in October, MAJ Jose Burgos (63E) successfully passed his oral board exam (2 of 3 sections complete), and MAJ Eric Hu (63F) passed two oral exams (Section B Part 4 and Section C) leaving him only one exam away from board certification.
