

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A JOURNEY OF MILITARY SERVICE AND LEADERSHIP

I chose a career as an Army Dental Officer because of the travel and education opportunities that it afforded me. As I have grown as an Army leader, I realized my service to the organization is as much a reward as any other benefits I have received.





in my decision to pursue military service. I was afforded the opportunity to participate in JROTC and ROTC receiving my commission as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army in 2004. My desires were always to serve this country and take advantage of the many educational and travel opportunities that the military had to offer. As an ROTC and HPSP scholarship recipient, I had an eight year active duty service obligation but planned to make the military a career.

After completing the comprehensive residency program at Fort Bragg, my career path took me upon a journey of many different leadership positions as Officer in Charge, Dental MOB/DEMOB at Fort Bliss; Director, Army Dental Assist Program at Fort Sam Houston; Commander, Dental Activity Japan, Camp Zama and, a broadening assignment at USUHS while receiving a master's degree in Health Administration and Policy and completing a yearlong fellowship at Washington DC Veterans Administration Medical Center which opened the door to serve in more administrative roles in healthcare.

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
WAR COLLEGE GRADUTION

2022 Army Dental Health Activity Bavaria Soldiers Commemorate Bataan Death March

On April 23, thirteen Soldiers from the Dental Health Activity Bavaria and Dental Health Command Europe SGM participated in a Bataan Memorial Death March. The 26.2-mile foot march began and ended in the picturesque Bavarian town of Amberg, Germany. The event commemorated the forced march of some 70,000 U.S. and Filipino prisoners of war captured by the Japanese in the Philippines during World War II. According to historians, the starving and ill-treated prisoners were forced to march 63 miles to a prison camp near the town of San Fernando on the island of Luzon. Of the 70,000 POWs, 54,000 prisoners lived to reach the camp. Nearly 10,000 died on the way, and others escaped in the jungle. The DENTAC Bavaria First Sergeant, 1SG Amadi, organized the event to commemorate the actual Bataan Death March and honor those who died and survived the grueling experience.

AOC SPOTLIGHT - 63P ORAL AND MAXILLOFACIAL PATHOLOGY

Oral pathology is a specialty of dentistry that focuses on diagnosing and treating oral diseases, including oral cancer. Pathologists are involved in all areas of disease management, including research, diagnosis, examination, and treatment.

In the Army, oral pathologists maintain a practice that may include conventional dental treatment in addition to providing oral pathology consultation and treatment. The Army oral pathologist also has the mission of forensic dental identification in the unfortunate event of a service member's death.

current inventory are serving tours in command, the Defense Health Agency, and strategic assignments.

The term "pathology" often strikes fear into the heart of a patient when counseled by their dental provider that they might need a referral for further evaluation. Patients presenting for a pathology evaluation are often concerned with the worst outcome, such as "cancer." However, there are many entities that can develop in the oral cavity that are far from malignant and can be easily treated. Most of these conditions have similar counterparts on the skin. For example, callouses that form on the hands of a weightlifter or heel blisters that develop from a long ruck. Often, time alone allows the oral tissues to heal from trauma or insult and return to normal. When lesions in the oral cavity do not return to normal and have conflicting etiology, a biopsy may be warranted. The pathologist may com-

mence with a biopsy or refer to an oral surgeon for the procedure. Then, when the microscopic slides are ready, the oral pathologist will "read" the slides and render a report. The oral pathologist will send the diagnostic report to the referring dental health care provider.

A robust and collegial relationship is essential between the dental provider and the oral pathologist. When the material on the microscopic slide is not congruent with the clinical presentation of the oral malady, a conversation must be had between the dentist and pathologist. It is frequently a quick consult to sort things out to render a timely and accurate diagnosis for the patient.
